The ASK Hive team are still waiting for the official thumbs-up from

Nottinghamshire County Council on buying roughly half of the former school grounds. But there *is* a glimmer of good news: NCC are lining up funding to demolish the old CLASP-style school building. Once that's gone, so too will the asbestos, lead paint, and all the other "vintage surprises" baked into its walls.

While the team wait — with fingers crossed and optimism intact — they've been busy reorganising. The management group has two focused teams:

- **The Community Engagement Team**, and
- **The Development Fund Team**

Both groups are gearing up to present their strategies at the next meeting on **March 10th**.

To help manage expectations, NCC's current timeline suggests completion around **this time next year**. That gives the ASK Hive teams a valuable window to plan community surveys and ask ***you*** — the residents of the Parish — what you'd love to see happening on the site. All those brilliant ideas will feed into the planning application, the architect's brief, and, of course, the big one the project costings.

It may feel like the finish line is still a little way off, but there's plenty to do between now and then. The hope is that, once the green light arrives, everything will be ready to move swiftly into the building phase and the major fundraising push. NCC have said they'll be in touch "shortly", so the team are keeping their ears pricked.

Sharp-eyed readers may also notice that the ASK Hive logo has had a little glow-up — a subtle tweak to make it brighter and more eye-catching.

And finally, a heartfelt thank-you goes to **Cllr. Sue Saddington** for her generous donation, which has funded ASK Hive's membership of the Plunkett Foundation — an organisation whose expertise is pure gold for rural community projects like ours.

Jenn Pell (Jennifer Hylene Pell)

On Monday 26th January 2026 we said farewell to someone whose friends described, in their messages of condolences, as "a lovely lady". Jenn passed away on 20th December 2025 in King's Mill Hospital. Jenn was born in Nottingham on 16th September 1947. She met her husband David when she visited an aunt in Lincoln when she was just thirteen years old.

The couple were married and lived in Nottingham before moving to South Muskham. When Jenn left the Grammar School, she went to work, for Lloyds Bank. She was working in the investment side of Lloyds Private Banking when she retired. Jenn like other members of her family suffered kidney disease and had dialysis at home and even at work for many years. She received a kidney transplant in the 1990s. The impact of having the transplant transformed her and David's lives. They travelled extensively to America and Canada.

Jenn played a very active role in St. Wilfrid's South Muskham, which she fell in love with when moving into the village. She served as churchwarden for many years and was devoted to St Wilfrid's. Jenn was key in organising fundraising activities for the church, including Craft Fairs, Coffee and cake afternoons, Teddy Bears' picnics and Carol concerts. When she retired from work, she busied herself helping children to read at Claypole and Newark schools. She volunteered in many roles at Newark hospital, helping out in Coffee Lounges, and many jobs in various departments of the hospital. She was a very active member of the Averham Kelham and Staythorpe branch of the Women's Institute. She appreciated its members' support to attend WI events in recent months. She was faithful not only to St Wilfrid's Church but the parish Churches of the wider Riverside Group. She offered her support and help, willingly. Her sense of humour and willingness to help others will be sadly missed in all the local villages but especially at St Wilfrid's South Muskham. Despite her increasingly obvious health difficulties attendance at Church was important to her. When asked how she was feeling her cheerful reply would come back. 'Never better!'

Rest in Peace, faithful servant.

ASK Garden Club Report



For our January meeting we welcomed Izzy Pass from The Sherwood Forest Trust. Established in 1995, this small charity works across the Sherwood Forest site protecting what remains of the ancient forest.

Izzy is their community tree nursery officer and one member of a very small dedicated team. Through hundreds of years, Sherwood Forest shrank from a huge medieval hunting forest to a fragmented patchwork of wood and heathland scattered across the modern county



of Nottinghamshire. The Sherwood Forest Trust has a mission to halt the decline by practical projects to restore woodland and heathland.

Planting twenty varieties of native trees, especially long lived English oaks, supports biodiversity and helps mitigate against climate change. It also enhances the local environment in an area which in the past was much scarred by coal mining.

Nottinghamshire, once rich in heathland, has lost 80% of its lowland heath since 1800. Last year large parts of Oak Tree Heath near Mansfield became a target for deliberate fire-setting. Local youth are taught in



school about the importance of saving the Amazonian rain forest, yet few realise the heathland on their doorstep is an actual remnant of Europe's most famous medieval hunting forest.

The Sherwood Seedbank founded in 2023 is a one-of-a-kind tree nursery and supported by Newark and Sherwood District Council.

ASK Garden Club Report Continued

Native tree and plant seeds are locally sourced in preference to sourcing from foreign nurseries which risk importing unwanted tree pathogens and diseases. The collected seeds are planted by community groups and



volunteers, 5000 trees were grown last year. Thousands of acorns were collected last autumn during the incredible mast year. Measures are taken to deter mice and Jays from feasting on them before they've sprouted by using wire and mesh to cover the cell trays and raised beds. Some of the trees grown at the nursery go to local schools and for communal and memorial planting. There is also a tree ownership scheme so people can

continue to look after them as for the first 2-3 years, establishing trees need consistent watering throughout the growing season (March to October).

Volunteering with Sherwood Forest Trust is a great way to connect with nature, meet like-minded individuals, and make a positive impact on our environment. Whether you have an hour to spare or more, they welcome all abilities and would love your support. <https://sherwoodforest.org.uk>

To the parishioners of the Riverside Benefice

A note on our first Christmas card stated, "at last we have a vicar after waiting three and a half years". One of our former Archbishops is quoted as saying that much of his correspondence concerned parish vacancies.

A wise former Bishop, Dr Barry, was installing a vicar in Rainworth when he remarked that he had heard of grumblings about the length of time it had taken to find a vicar. In response he asked, "Did your parish produce a priest to serve the church?" It's a question every parish needs to ask itself.

Both Muriel(my wife) and I were once 'Directors of Ordinands'

responsible for meeting men and women considering being ordained.

Some presented themselves quite certain that God had called them to be ordained. Not only that, they knew at which college they should be trained. Other men and women had quite a different approach. They realised that the church needed priests and thought it was right to investigate whether they themselves were called.

We would discuss how this would have to be a joint decision between wife and husband, what sacrifices would need to be made – a well-paid job given up, moving from a pleasant house to an upstairs college flat while studying, children having to change schools. However, before all of this, the person contemplating ordination would go on a residential selection conference where he or she would have an in-depth interview with priests and lay people and undertake group exercises.

I remember at my own selection conference, the priest interviewing me asked what I might want to say. I replied that I did not think I was worthy enough to be a priest. "Worthy enough?" he declared "Worthy enough, of course you are not worthy enough. None of us is worthy to do the work He calls us to do. Do you think I'm worthy enough?" No one is worthy to do whatever work God calls us to do. We rely on His help and generosity and that of other people.

April 26th is Vocation Sunday when we pray for those considering God's call to the priesthood and for those helping them to make the right decision. A prayer –

"Lord help us to believe that we are all ordinary people made extraordinary through your vision and your power. Take our insecurities and feelings of inadequacy and give us courage to see us with gifts and potential to transform your world and build your kingdom".

Amen Blessings to you all.

Tools With A Mission – a personal story

Last year we were in the sad position of having to deal with my late son's possessions including a surprising number of DIY tools. Some were almost brand new; others had belonged to his grandfather (my father) and kept for sentimental reasons.

We could not absorb these into our own tool store because over the years my husband had already assembled his own

huge collection as well as those inherited from our parents. He'd also recently decided that apart from routine maintenance he was giving up DIY projects for good!

Having decided what he wanted to keep, we then had to work out what to do with the rest, all of which were in working order and too good to just be dumped. We found that charity shops did not want them – certainly not in the quantity we had – and no one was interested in buying a basic B&Q drill; they only wanted high-end brands. But a little bit of internet searching led me to Tools With A Mission (TWAM). They supply tools to other charities and community groups, across the UK and some African countries.

It was a WIN-WIN-WIN solution:

1. it was simple: an email, a phone call, and within a few days someone came to collect them from our house
2. the tools are put to good use
3. no money changed hands: we just decluttered our garage.

I was delighted when Phil Staniforth (Kelham Churchwarden) agreed to using Kelham Church as a donation point. I do hope you can support it too by Spring Cleaning your shed, or garage or wherever you keep your own tool kit and donating anything surplus to requirements.
