If you've ever walked past the Averham church and wondered why it smells faintly of glue sticks and joy, chances are you've stumbled upon



**Messy Church**—a monthly gathering that's less about pews and sermons, and more about paint-splattered aprons, biscuit crumbs, and belly laughs.

## So what is Messy Church?

At its heart, Messy Church is a place where families come together to explore big ideas through creativity, play, and shared food. Yes, it's hosted by the church, but don't worry—there's no pressure to pray, sing hymns, or know your Corinthians from your Chronicles. 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## **Averham Church Open Afternoon and Macmillan Fundraiser**

Averham Church was packed on the afternoon of 20<sup>th</sup> September. Villagers from not just Averham but also Kelham and Staythorpe came along to enjoy the events. And there were visitors not only from our villages but friends and relatives of villagers and even some members of The Thoroton Society (Nottinghamshire's History and Archaeological Society), all interested to find out more about this ancient and important building.

The afternoon began with a presentation by Dr Chris Brooke, Honorary Associate Professor, University of Nottingham. Chris explained that his fascination with Averham Church began when he was 17 to the extent that he had included a study of the Church as part of his PhD thesis. Based on external examination of the fabric of the Church – including the herringbone masonry – Chris and others had concluded that the building was a pre-Conquest structure but with later modifications, repairs and remodelling. The removal of the bells and clock mechanism in 2012 allowed for a more detailed study, particularly of the tower. This analysis revealed traces of an earlier roof line and more importantly a blocked up arched opening at first floor level in the east facing wall (i.e. the wall that faces the Nave). In 2018 and again in 2020 brick and rubble were removed from the archway but the whole doorway could not be opened up as a large, flat stone had at sometime been inserted to block the opening. By good fortune, a small remnant of oak timber was found along the former roofline which was radio-carbon dated to the year 1000 plus or minus 33 years, thus confirming Chris's previous conclusions about the early date for the construction of the church. In summary, St Michael and All Angels is a rare Anglo-Saxon stone-built church, with a two-storied tower, Nave and Chancel, all constructed in the late 10<sup>th</sup> or very early 11<sup>th</sup> century making it an important and rare survival.

A full description of Chris's findings including photographs and diagrams as well as his conclusions about the importance of Averham church have been published by Cambridge University Press and can be read on-line by rearching for Antiquaries Journal Averham. After Chris's talk, the Bell Ringers gave us a resounding peel which was best heard outside the church and a few people took up the offer to 'have-a-go-at bell ringing'. Other brave souls, including a 93 year old, climbed the tower steps to view some of the ancient masonry and admire



In October members enjoyed a talk by Karen Wynyard, who is one of the team of Southwell Wool Bombers. She gave the extraordinary story of how it all began in

2017. It was the vision of Sue Rodgers who managed to gather a team of 30 people prepared to knit very intricate designs and straight forward squares which most of us can manage! They ended up with so many squares that an almost full size elephant was created and held court in Southwell Library!

The very much reduced team have managed to present an exhibition every year since with themes ranging from The Lost Sons of Southwell (in remembrance of those young men lost in WW1 and WW2). Stitching Up, Christmas Yarn Bomb, Green Southwell, Flowers, the Queen's Jubilee and the King's Coronation. Plans are in hand, and knitting needles working hard, in preparation for next year but the theme is top secret!

It is necessary to start on the next year's exhibits almost directly following the end of the last as there is so much work to pull together. The team need to create 130 bollard caps alone solely for King Street and Queen Street in Southwell, as there are 112 bollards. Sadly it is necessary to make extra to cover work of the vandals and wear and tear damage. A mammoth task but the team feel it is well worth the effort for the community spirit that it creates and raises money for local charities.

November sees us bracing ourselves for the Christmas celebrations when member Tracey Young will be helping us make a Christmas Wreath from ribbons and bits and bobs. ## The ASK Hive team: poised, buzzing, and slightly twitchy...

Still waiting for their grand moment in front of the NCC Property and Finance Committee, the ASK Hive team are beginning to feel like kids outside a sweet shop—nose pressed to the glass,

waiting for someone to open the door. The proposal, agreed with officials way back in August and December last year, seems to have missed the October meeting bus. Next stop: November.

But don't worry, the team haven't been twiddling their thumbs! While the Committee gets its ducks in a row, the ASK team has been flapping its wings in preparation for the next big phase in the adventure: **Development Funding**. This phase involves a dizzying array of surveys—topographical, biodiversity, trees, ground reports, ecological, asbestos, noise... basically, if it can be measured, sniffed, or mapped, it's on the list. About fifteen in total. Yes, fifteen. Deep breaths.

Add to that the legal conveyancing, contracts, architects, structural engineers, and other delightful grown-up things, and you've got a price tag of around £90,000. Gulp.

Thankfully, some of these surveys may already be tucked away in NCC's filing cabinet and could be generously handed over (fingers and toes crossed). For the rest, there's a sprinkle of grant funding and a hopeful eye on friendly professionals who might be willing to lend a hand—pro bono or at a kindly discounted rate. If you know a tree whisperer or a legal guru, now's the time to say hello.

Meanwhile, the team is crafting a business prospectus to rally local support and raise funds. Think of it as a love letter to the community—with spreadsheets. And with a new Parish Plan in the works, they're planning some good old-fashioned door-to-door chats to explain both initiatives and how villagers can get involved.

If the NCC Committee gives the green light, it'll be all hands to the helm, hoist the sails, and full steam ahead. The Hive is ready to buzz into action.

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#### **FAITH AND PRAYER**

A political leader recently said that though they had been a practising worshipper since childhood, they had later ceased to have a faith because of unanswered prayers - particularly those of someone else who had suffered dreadfully at the cruel hands of their father. A Rabbi responded, "The power of prayer is not that it alters reality, but that it can change us." It's clear that many, perhaps most, prayers don't achieve the requested result, if we're praying for what we desire, irrespective of other considerations.

Jesus said, "Whatever you ask in my name . . . . ." and that's the crucial part, seeking to attune ourselves and our desires to what's best, what's God's will. Even Jesus' prayer on the Cross, "Father, take this cup from me " didn't get the hoped for response. But he added "yet, not my will, but yours be done." The eventual outcome (his Crucifixion, Resurrection, and our salvation) was what was "best" - that was his life's purpose.

An Archbishop once said, "When I pray, miracles happen; when I don't, they don't." And he didn't mean getting what he wanted, but that things worked out better - perhaps his understanding changed. We may not get our own way, but we may find that we are guided to discover the best way - indeed our understanding may change.

I have found that we discover the value of prayer if we see it as part of our developing faith. We shouldn't give up because "it doesn't work." Things that can help are:

- practice; keeping at it and seeing how to adapt the prayer:
- reading the Bible regularly; it's amazing how a Bible verse can "speak to" our situation; I've known it to have a direct impact on people:
- taking part in Church worship (something in a sermon, in a prayer, in a hymn, or the words of the Service) can be particularly relevant:
- praying with someone else, or in a small group:
- something we read in a 'spiritual' book or article.

Prayer, then, is essentially about discovering what is best (God's will) and then pursuing this, seeking the guidance and ability to do this.

Prayer and "listening" go hand in hand - lots of ifs and buts, challenging but potentially rewarding. "The power of prayer is . . . . that it can change us."

"Almighty God, you have made us for yourself, and our hearts are restless till they find their rest in you; pour your love into our hearts and draw us to yourself, that . . . . .
