My theme for front covers this year has been trees. I thought about a Willow Tree given the beautiful collection we have along our stretch of the River Trent but given the Cricket Season has now started I thought about this particular variety

Bat willow trees are a traditional variety of white willow grown specifically for making cricket bats. Their wood is light, strong and naturally shock absorbent, making it ideal for the sport. These trees grow quickly along riverbanks and damp ground, and their long, straight trunks can be harvested after around 15 years. Bat willows also support local wildlife, providing habitat for insects and birds while helping stabilise river edges. In managed plantations, they are carefully pruned to encourage clean, knot free timber, and once felled, new saplings are often planted to maintain a sustainable cycle of growth. (These trees are in Oxfordshire).

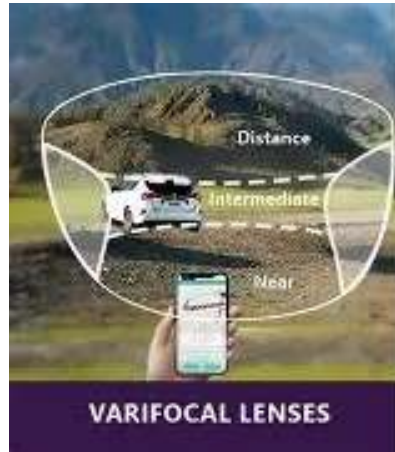

How's Your Vision ?



There are times in all our lives and working lives when we have to try to look ahead, consider our direction, our purpose and what our core values are. We sometimes call this 'vision'. I'm in that place with some of my church communities at the moment, looking at where God is leading us next and in some places planning for future change. It got me thinking about vision.

We use a lot of phrases surrounding vision - for example, I'm long-sighted which is great for seeing things in the distance, road signs etc (I normally win eye-spy!) but not so great for reading the instructions on food packets (why do they have to make the print so small!) It's interesting because I'm also one who likes to look ahead, vision for the future, dream about how we can move things forward and I don't always think about the details along the way.

Others are short-sighted (which unfortunately carries with it more of a stigma - no one likes to be called short-sighted!) Perhaps things in the distance are a blur and things closer to are in sharper focus.

A couple of years ago I got vari-focals for the first time - it was a revelation! They are amazing! When I first walked out of the opticians following their fitting I couldn't believe my eyes. I could see street signs and shop windows crystal clear and then as I look at the messages on my smart watch, they too were crystal clear. With one seamless lens they have several prescriptions wonderfully placed to bring close-to things into sharp focus as I look down and distant objects into sharper focus as I look up. What a wonderful invention.

I wonder if there is something to learn from vari-focal lenses. I think it's something about community. You see, if you place a group of long-sighted, visionary folk in a room together and asked them to steer a community, I think they'd come up with some pretty exciting stuff! The problem is, they'd probably also start to stumble as they tried to implement even the first steps (they'd be too busy looking at the horizon to notice the stumbling blocks at their feet)! Similarly if you put a load of short-sighted, perhaps more practical folk into a room and asked them to steer, it could be a smooth journey to anywhere or nowhere.

Of course things aren't as binary as that in real life but the beauty of community is that we are all on that spectrum and when we work together we own that spectrum perfectly as a kind of vari-focal steer. I'm deeply thankful for folk in my churches who are different from me. Not only do they make life less boring but they help me immensely. Sometimes they put on the handbrake, sometimes they just help me sidestep a stumbling block and in turn I hope I help them realise their dreams as well as mine.

What communities are you part of? How do you contribute to the vari-focal lens and have you thought about thanking someone who approaches things differently from you? Thank them for the important part they play in your journey as well as the collective journey of your communities.

Come and Follow Me

One of Jesus' most regular phrases in the gospels, as he goes round and speaks with the diverse range of people he meets, is: '*Come, follow me.*' It's an open invitation – a call to 'discipleship', a call to a whole new way of life following after him.

The call was not unusual in Jesus' day – there were other rabbis and teachers around at the time – each with their own band of 'disciples' or 'followers'. The difference was that Jesus' invitation was not just to the cleverest or most studious, but to everyone and anyone he would meet – to the rich and the religious yes, but also to humble fishermen, tax collectors, and sinners.

More than just a nice addition to the Christian faith - being a disciple, a follower, an apprentice of Jesus, is actually what it's all about. Being a Christian, at its core, is not just about what we *believe* (though that's important), or how we *behave* (that's important too), it's about who we will choose to follow.

As John Donne once famously wrote; 'no man is an island' and despite how 'independent' or 'free spirited' we might feel, the reality is that we are all followers of someone or something. Maybe it's the politicians of your favoured party that you listen to, the social commentators in your favourite newspaper, or the 'influencers' of social media. Perhaps it's our families, our colleagues, our peers whose opinions and perspectives we value most, or whose behaviours rub off on us. We all influence and follow others.

The challenge we find though is that not all ways are equal, and we can so easily, as the bible puts it, 'like sheep be led astray'.

To be a Christian is to be one who has made the decision then (in a world full of alternatives) to follow the Good Shepherd Jesus. To be those who have allowed ourselves to be drawn back into his fold and who, in a noisy world, commit ourselves to listening for his voice and learning his way.

At St Michael's Church in Farnsfield over recent weeks it's been a joy to host the new 'Disciple' course series which our diocese has produced. This has provided a wonderful opportunity for many from our new 'Rural Cluster 3' and further afield to come together over five Wednesday evenings to explore what being a disciple of Jesus really looks like and means in today's world and refocus our following of him. As those attending the course discovered, far from being a sombre and sober affair, a life lived with Jesus (both in the days of the bible and still today) is always full of adventure, wonder, and joy. We should expect to be both stretched and strengthened, confronted and comforted as we follow the One who came, full of grace and truth, to free us and to lead us into fulness of life in Him.



'Come, follow me' is still Jesus' open invitation to every one of us today, and as Bishop Paul (our diocesan Bishop) often says; 'there is really no better way to live a life than as a follower of Jesus.' I know, for my own part, I've found that to be true and I know countless others have too. How about you?

South Muskham and Little Carlton Parish Council

Our Chair and Members were saddened to receive the resignation of Councillor Ron Gill following 51 years of service to the village. Unfortunately, issues with his health have led to Councillor Gill making the decision to step away from a role he has been so dedicated to. Members will miss his dry wit and extensive knowledge of both communities and the issues they have faced. We wish him well for the future.

The Parish Council will be seeking to fill the vacancy left by Councillor Gill. Notices will be placed in the noticeboards and highlighted in the news section of the website (www.smlcpc.org)

A request has been made for the white lining at the junction and painting of the mini roundabout to be replenished.

Members noted recent changes in the speed limit at East Stoke and changes to the signage that had been installed to reinforce this. The Clerk is investigating with Officers at Via to establish if something similar could be considered at Little Carlton.

Concern has been expressed at the speed of motorbikes travelling along the A616 at estimated speeds of 100mph. Members again noted that average speed cameras were the only tool that motorists would respect in relation to speed limits. A formal request would be made to Councillor Laughton for a scheme to be introduced along the A616.

Members are trying to establish an appropriate place on Crow Lane to install an additional dog waste bin.

The Examination Hearings in relation to the Great North Road Solar Park closed on 28th April 2026. There will now be a further process of consideration by the Planning Inspectorate, but no further opportunity for comments from organisations or individuals. It is expected that a decision will be reached by the Autumn.

The next meeting of the Parish Council will be held on **Wednesday, 17th June 2026 at 7.30pm in the South Muskham Village Hall.**

The next meeting will then be on Wednesday, 15th July 2026.

North Muskham Parish Council – May 2026

The May meeting of the Parish Council is the Annual Meeting where Members elect a Chair and Vice-Chair and confirm representation on outside bodies and dates of meetings for the forthcoming Civic Year.

Councillor Ian Harrison was elected to the office of Chair, with Councillor Gary Hobbs elected to the office of Vice-Chair.

Meeting dates were confirmed as:

The Annual Parish Meeting will be held at 6.30pm on Monday, 15th June, prior to the next ordinary meeting of the Parish Council which will start at 7pm.

Information had been received from the Planning Enforcement team at Newark & Sherwood District Council concerning The Willows, with Members noting that the landowner had been asked to submit a retrospective application for planning permission to retain the use of the private lake for fishing. It has been concluded by Planning Enforcement that fishing on a riverbank (including the vehicular movements associated with this) does not require planning permission. The Parish Council will be consulted when any planning application is submitted to Newark & Sherwood District Council. Updates were received in relation to the Neighbourhood Plan, Emergency Plan, Café/Hub project, and Blooming North Muskham.

At the May meeting of the Safer Neighbourhood Group a request had been made for a more visible Police presence in the village. Residents are encouraged to sign up to the Notts Alerts (www.nottsalerts.co.uk), a community alert system.

Members noted that the Examination Hearings for the Great North Road Solar closed on 28th April, with the Planning Inspectorate having until 28th July to issue their view on the application. An application for a solar farm at Foxholes Farm, Bathley Hill, had been unanimously refused by Newark & Sherwood District Council. This would have seen construction traffic use Vicarage Lane. A new contractor has been retained to replace the Parish Council's current handyman who would be retiring in June.

A further village wide litter pick will be held on Saturday, 20th June 2026, starting at 10am from the MRCC. Please come along and support if you can. All equipment will be provided.

The next meeting of the Parish Council will be held on Monday, 15th June 2026 at 7pm in the MRCC. It will be preceded by the Annual Parish Meeting which will be start at 6.30pm.

Spring in the New Forest Jane Southey Ecologist

We were lucky enough to spend that glorious mid April week—when sunshine bathed the whole country—in the New Forest. Until now, my only visits had been long field survey days, “with memories of curious velvety noses extended out towards me as I quietly worked on vegetation quadrats.” This time, I could finally enjoy the Forest for its beauty: the ponies, the sweeping heaths, ancient woodlands, wetlands, and the charming villages woven between them, all edged by the Hampshire coast.

Covering 220 square miles, the New Forest’s unique landscape supports an extraordinary diversity of rare plants and animals, one of the reasons it became a National Park in 2005. Generations of freely roaming ponies, cattle and pigs have shaped this mosaic of habitats. These animals belong to the New Forest commoners—people whose land or property carries traditional rights such as **Common of Pasture**, allowing ponies, cattle, donkeys and mules to graze the Open Forest; **Common of Mast**, permitting pigs to eat autumn acorns; and historic rights like **Estovers**, a supply of firewood. The ancient Verderers’ Court, dating back to the 13th century, still upholds these rules.

Spring is foaling season, timed so that newborns arrive as the grass comes through. This year, 25 stallions had just been released—“the boys are back”—and with breeding on their minds, road safety is not their top priority. Drivers and visitors are urged to keep their distance from amorous stallions herding mares at speed. I was lucky enough to see one newborn foal, stretched out asleep in the sun within an hour of birth.

It was still a little early for a dip at iconic spots like Brock Beach on the Lymington River, though a warm spell at nearby Highcliffe Beach had me wishing for a wetsuit and surf mat. Instead, we explored the arboretums along Rhinefield Road and the Bolderwood Ornamental Drive, home to magnificent giant redwoods and a perfect cycling route that must be spectacular in autumn.



We made the most of the miles of walking and cycling paths, serenaded by cuckoos and other spring migrants. A highlight was an eight mile walk through Roydon Woods Nature Reserve, its ancient woodland carpeted with bluebells and dotted with centuries old linear barrows, giving way to open heathland.



We will certainly return—perhaps for that autumn bike ride beneath the towering trees of the arboretum drive.

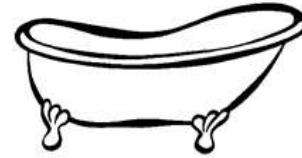

Jess's Rule **Three strikes and we rethink**

If a patient presents three times with the same symptoms or concerns, particularly if symptoms unexpectedly persist, escalate, or remain unexplained, it's time to rethink.

- Reflect:** Think back on what the patient has said and consider what has changed or been missed. Offer ongoing continuity of care with follow-up. If previous consultations have been remote, see the patient face-to-face and conduct a physical examination.
- Review:** Where underlying uncertainty exists, consider seeking a view from a peer and review any red flags that may suggest another diagnosis, regardless of the patient's age or demographic.
- Rethink:** If appropriate, refer onwards for further tests or for specialist input.
