Peace

At his first public mass, the new Pope, Leo xivth exhorted the leaders of the world to strive for PEACE. The magazine's front cover this month is an image of the rose 'Peace' I was fascinated to learn of its developmental history which started 90 years ago in 1935. I hope you too find it interesting. Moving on.....



A cautionary tale (or should that be tail.)

A few Sundays ago, Ken my husband took Mostyn our black labrador for a walk along the bank of the River Trent near Hoveringham village. Then as is his usual practice he went sailing. When I got to the Sailing Club about an hour later I was concerned that Mostyn did not appear his usual self. He appeared subdued. He was not interested in poking his nose at the table where people had started to eat their lunches. Then he sort of lost his sitting balance. When Ken came off the water we took him for a short walk. I was still concerned so I phoned the vet, described his symptoms and was advised to bring him immediately. By the time I reached the vet's, about twenty minutes later, Mostyn was unable to get out of the car and was very agitated. A usually very docile dog, I suggested we put a muzzle on and together the vet and I carried him into the surgery.

I was so impressed with the Vet; the care she took examining him and working through a range of possible diagnoses. I could see Mostyn deteriorating before my eyes as he sagged to the floor. The vet said that Mostyn was not giving her any clue as to what was wrong. Then we looked at his eyes. There was no iris. His pupils were fully dilated. The Vet said I think I know what has happened but I need to run full blood tests and full vital organ functioning tests to rule out other diagnoses. When all the tests came back negative she said 'I think this is cannabinoid poisoning'. The classic signs are very low heart beat rate (despite being very agitated) leaking urine, uncoordinated movements and diluted pupils. She asked if we had been to a public park and I mentioned we had been to Clumber Park the day before. The Vet explained the symptoms were consistent with Mostyn ingesting the substance that morning. Mostyn was on a drip for 8 hours and required to ingest large doses of charcoal to absorb the toxins. Thanks to very prompt action he is back to his usual self. However another friend from the Sailing Club having been to Colwick Park was concerned about their Dalmatian but there was a greater time delay in noticing the symptoms and when they got to the Vet were told 'I may not be able to save your dog.' Thankfully Daisy has recovered fully. But please be aware. I didn't even know this was a risk to watch. The question about being in a Public Park reflected the Vet's experience of that being the location of other dogs experiencing similar trauma. Susan Twemlow

Continued from front page But three months later Hitler invaded France and, with the nursery under threat of destruction, three parcels of budwood were hastily sent out of France, one of which was smuggled out in the diplomatic bag to America.

For the duration of the war the Meilland family had no idea whether any of the budwood had survived. In America their agent planted the rose in his own trial beds and gave it to other rose growers for testing in all the climatic zones throughout the United States. The rose did so well that it was decided to release it in the United States and thousands of plants were propagated. Although the war was still raging in Europe, the launch date was set for 29 April 1945, in Pasadena, California.

On the same day that two doves were released into the American sky to symbolise the naming of the rose, Berlin fell and a truce was declared. It was sheer coincidence. In naming the rose, this simple statement was read: "We are persuaded that this greatest new rose of our time should be named for the world's greatest desire: 'PEACE'."

'Peace' went on to receive the All American Award for roses on the day that the war in Japan came to an end. On May 8, 1945, when Germany signed its surrender, the 49 delegates who met to form the United Nations were each presented with a bloom of 'Peace' and a message of peace from the Secretary of the American Rose Society.

In France, the rose had been named 'Madame Antoine Meilland' in memory of Claudia Dubreuil, the wife of Antoine Meilland and mother of Francis. At the same time news coming back from Germany and Italy where other budwood had been sent, revealed that in Italy the rose was called 'Gioia' (Joy) and in Germany, 'Gloria Dei' (Glory of God). For the family, all the names captured the qualities that they loved in Claudia.

The name 'Peace' seems to have outlasted all the others. The timing of its launch was perfect and it struck such a chord that within nine years some 30 million 'Peace' rose bushes were flowering around the world. But it wasn't because of sentiment alone. 'Peace' truly was a superlative rose, superior by far to the roses before it in terms of vigour, hardiness, and the long lasting ability of its blooms. The colour was also magnificent, a pale, golden yellow deepening to red along the petal edges.

Its contribution to the rose world has been immeasurable. Because of its vigour and dependability, 'Peace' has been used in breeding programmes across the world. It is recorded that 'Peace' is the 'mother' in 150 varieties and the 'father' in a further 180 varieties. 'Peace' also breathed new life into the gardening world, which sorely needed reviving after the war. The huge amount of publicity it received internationally made people excited about growing roses again. It has been said that 'Peace' is in every public park and the 'must have' variety for every garden. Because it grew so well and so easily, people were not afraid to try their hand at other roses and so the rose industry took off, once again.

BEING A PRIEST FOR 60 YEARS

On Trinity Sunday (15 June) I celebrate the 60th Anniversary of my Ordination as a Priest. Here I reflect on some of the blessings of being a Vicar. I will be leading our Parishes' Holy Communion Service that day at Kelham at 9.30, and any who would like to join us will be most welcome. As a Priest you hope to enable people to encounter our Heavenly Father and Jesus Christ our Saviour, and the relationship can be like that of a senior family member enabling others to grow in their experience of God. This may be in leading worship - it is striking how inspiring worship can be for Christians, whether it's a very 'ordered' Service, or something less formal. And in Sermons - there have been occasions when years later someone has said "I recall what you said on such-and-such occasion, and it meant so much to me."

Or in preparing couples for their Wedding, where together we explore some of the depths and meaning of the husband-wife relationship, and how God and the assurance of His blessing can be a vital ingredient in a marriage. Some have later said how these insights have helped them.

Or before a Christening, as I've talked with parents about what Baptism signifies (New Life in Christ), and how they can enable their child to discover the riches of the Faith in the years ahead. Indeed for some parents this has marked a real renewal in their own faith, and led them to a deeper Christian commitment, often expressed in their local Church.

Or in connection with a Funeral, as one seeks to help a bereaved person to experience inner comfort and strength in a time of sorrow.

Or simply praying with people

One of the privileges of Priesthood for me has been that the Priest is Vicar not just of the local Church, but of the whole Parish - the area in which the Church is set. This has enabled me to call on folk at home or visit local groups to offer support and take an interest in their lives and activities. This can help to link the "spiritual" with the "everyday", as the Church is visibly involved - just as God is interested in us and our lives whether we're religious or not, and that we can "involve" Him through even the smallest degree of faith. And that can grow . . . like a seed.

Seeing people grow in their awareness of God and faith in their lives has been a great joy and privilege for me.

You are not alone!

I remember, in the late nineties, being into the X-Files. In the series a couple of FBI agents would travel around the USA investigating stories of the paranormal; UFOs and the like. There were a couple of strap lines like 'You are not alone' and 'The Truth is Out There'! (I think I had a UFO poster with that slogan on my wall at University!) It was a great series. There was more to life than could be seen! I don't know whether there is life on other planets (it's seems odd to conclude that there can't be when there is so much of the universe that is uncharted!) but I am utterly convinced that there is more to life than what we can see! Before the 20th century we didn't know such things as bacteria existed because they were too small to see, gravity was only named (discovered?) In the 17th century! We are constantly discovering more about what we cannot necessarily see with the naked eye or do not understand.

But I'm not going to use this article to persuade you of the existence of aliens. I'd much rather use it to reassure you that you are not alone; you are never alone!

The two messages I always try to leave school children with when I lead collective worship are that **God Loves You** (this is unconditional - whoever we are, whatever we're like, whatever we've done or not done, God loves us!) and the **God is with you**. Indeed nothing can separate us from God and God's love.

June 8th is Pentecost Sunday. It's the day when the church celebrates the pouring out of God's Holy Spirit (sometimes thought of as the birth of the church!) The disciples had witnessed first-hand the death of Jesus and seen not only the empty tomb but the risen Christ. But then Jesus ascended into heaven and left them behind. Why did he do this? Well, in the physical person of Jesus, God was able to get alongside us, demonstrate his power in miracles, inspire us with his teachings and let us know how much God loved us and wanted us to love one-another. But imagine that being the same approach now, God constricted to one place and time, the reach would still be limited. Instead Jesus goes back to the Father and sends the Holy Spirit. From the powerful creating power of God, to the skin-on close at hand person of Jesus and on to the enduring, ever-present person of the Holy Spirit! God's Holy Spirit has always been present (God the Holy Spirit is mentioned in the first passage of the Bible, at creation!) but at Pentecost the Holy Spirit was poured out for all!

What this means is that God is always with you, wherever you are, whatever you're doing. If you ever feel alone, know that you are not. You need only stop, take a breath and pray the wonderful prayer, 'Come Holy Spirit.' (Or whatever words you find!) My prayer is that you will know and notice God with you, by the Holy Spirit when you need it most - You are not alone!

Summary of North Muskham Parish Council Meetings-12/5/2025 Ian Harrison Chairman

Annual General Meeting:

1. A report from the outgoing chairman was received.

2. Ian Harrison was elected Chairman and Gary Hobbs Vice Chairman.

3. Financial Statements were received and noted from the Muskham Rural

Community Centre (MRCC) and the Mary Woolhouse Trust.

Annual Meeting of the Parish Council:

1. A document from Newark and Sherwood District Council outlining its draft statement on strategic housing and land availability assessment was discussed and a collective response would be made including the comments of the Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group.

2. Appointments were made for the Allotments and Personnel sub committees and Parish Council (PC) representatives on various outside forums were agreed.

3. Councillors considered the Council's Risk Register and Asset Register.

4. Meetings for the next year were agreed and will take place every 2nd Monday of the month except August.

5. The Allotment's Report was noted and agreed to get the container suitably painted. 6. Councillor Luke outlined the success of Basic Life Support training events held to date. It was noted that the 2nd defibrillator is awaiting an electric supply to be fitted but the original defibrillator still is available at the MRCC.

7. Councillor Hobbs updated re the Emergency Plan and Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group.

8. Noted that the new safety surfacing had been completed in the Children's play area and now just awaiting re-installation of the bucket swing. 2 new picnic tables would now be ordered and a new additional waste bin provided.

7. The Chairman reported on the success of the 80th Anniversary VE Day evening event and requested that the Commonwealth War Grave in the churchyard, of GH Jackson be suitably maintained as a mark of respect and the clerk will request maintenance by the Commonwealth War Graves Commission.

8. The Chairman reported on progress of the Cafe Hub steering group which was now awaiting the compilation of an outline business plan to test viability of the proposal and also the draft agreement proposal of the Methodists to include adequate protection for all partners. Alternative funding mechanisms would also be explored.

9. The issues and complaints around ill considered parking on pavements in the village especially on Nelson Lane when football games are taking place was discussed and the PC will again ask for access to parking on the field to be allowed and encouraged when large numbers are expected.

10. The issues with quad bikes in the village and the riverside footpath were discussed and measures agreed to prevent this including further discussions with Notts Police. Villagers are encouraged to report any such activity to the Police on 101 or if you consider that life is at risk, on 999.

11. Various areas of poor roadways were highlighted for reporting to NCC Highways. 12. A reminder that the village summer fayre will be on June 21st at 12 noon. Free admission!, Bar, BBQ, tethered balloon and pony rides, Bouncy Castle, games, activities, Craft stall, cakes and coffee, etc etc

Spring Wildlife Roundup and some Local Wildlife Memories

Well as the days of spring roll over we have had some lovely sunny days, but the lack of rain and often cold nights means that wildlife has had to deal with some challenging conditions. Make sure you leave shallow containers of clean water out for birds and other wildlife.

The ground is very hard and here in Bathley the usual badger digging that I see around the village has slowed down as their favourite food earth worms, have burrowed deeper into the soil to avoid the dry conditions. Worms can typically make up about 80 percent of a badger's diet. Badgers are having to look to other food sources and as they are omnivores this will include animal and plant material. They will eat slugs and insects and forage on carcasses. It's too early in the season for wild fruits and crop raiding.

Some fifteen years ago I was walking our dog up towards Bathley Hill on the footpath bordered by a maize crop. I had noticed badger damage in the crop on previous walks, but I was amazed to be confronted by a female badger with three kits in tow approaching me on the footpath from up the hill. Totally unperturbed by us she scolded the kits into the crop where they proceeded to pull down the maize and tuck into the ripe cobs. The dog looked at me and remained motionless. The next thing the female came back on the footpath right in front of me and began chiding and chittering a late kit who was just coming down the hill. Obviously late for dinner! So, it's not just humans who have to round up kids for dinner.

Butterflies seem to have done better this spring and there also seem to generally be more flying bugs as evidenced by my bug plastered windscreen on the car which is needing regular cleaning. This was not the case last year. Brimstone *Gonepteryx rhamni* were the first butterfly visitors to my garden this spring closely followed by large white *Pieris brassicae* and green veined white *Pieris napi*. Orange tip *Anthocharis cardamines* butterflies made an appearance in my garden to sup on the nectar of Honesty and Garlic Mustard flowers just as they were coming into flower. Orange tip will lay their eggs on Garlic Mustard and Cuckoo flowers and the caterpillars can be cannibalistic and eat unhatched orange tip eggs.

The hybrid spotted orchids are showing early in a field that I monitor locally, and the local blossom show has been glorious. Let's hope that it will lead to a bountiful fruit harvest for people and wildlife alike!

After eagerly awaiting the house sparrows *Passer domesticus* taking up residence in the wooden sparrow "hotel" nestbox I erected on the house, the presence of nesting blue tits *Cyanistes caeruleus* as the new hotel residents was heralded by my cat sitting watching them and miaowing from the front step.

The box is over three metres off the ground so fat cat can not get up to them! If you are erecting nest boxes, make sure they are well off the ground and as inaccessible as possible to predators such as cats.

Our recent toad patrols on Crow Lane saw dry and often windy conditions and little rain. We moved 374 toads to safety during their annual migration to the Crow Lane breeding pond and most of them were male. Tough times for the small number of female toads which are often drowned during amplexus when many males may mount a female to make a big toad pile. Let's hope that wasn't the case.

On the 14th and 20th of June the Nottinghamshire Bat Group is undertaking bat surveys at the ancient St Wilfrid's Church, North Muskham. The presence of roosting bats has already been confirmed in the church and these update surveys will be undertaken as part of the National Monitoring Programme.

Keep your eyes open in the early evening for batty antics with bats using their razor-sharp echo locating skills to catch mouthfuls of juicy flying insects. We have brown long eared *Plecotus auritus* and common pipistrelles *Pipistrellus pipistrellus* bats regularly hawking in our garden. They hunt along regular foraging routes and that's why it's important to understand these when planning new developments which could disrupt those important corridors. **Jane Southey Ecologist**




