

ASK Garden Club Report April 2025

We welcomed Andrew Young back to our group in March. Andrew had previously presented to us on his visits to many beautiful gardens throughout Japan. At this meeting

he gave us an account on the History of the **National Garden Scheme**, how it all began and how it works today.

It all started with a wealthy merchant, William Rathbone from Liverpool, who employed a nurse, Mary Robinson to care for his dying wife. After she died he kept Mary on to look after the sick and poor in his neighbourhood. In 1860 he approached Florence Nightingale for advice on how to build a training facility as he wished

to provide a nurse in every district of Liverpool. With Florence's help The District Nursing Service was born.

District nursing grew rapidly and spread across the country. By 1887 it the Oueen's Institute became Nursing with Queen Victoria as patron. Queen Alexandra succeeded Queen Victoria and on her death the QNI set up a fund in her memory, and this appeal then the became **National Garden Scheme.**

In 1927 £8,191 was raised from 609 open gardens, with an admission of just one shilling (5p) a head. In 1939 gardens were opened as part of the war effort and in 1948 the NHS and local authorities took over the home nursing service. The 1949 garden guide book turned into the now familiar yellow

symbolising a mood of national regeneration. King Charles III became patron in 2002 and in 2016 Mary Berry was made president of the NGS.

The National Garden Scheme in 2025 now has over 3,300 gardens open throughout the year including over 860 new and returning gardens, 46 allotment groups, 56 community and 12 hospice gardens. Dogs are welcome in 1,641 gardens and 1,830 offer plants for sale.

Our visits make a difference with £3.5 million donated in 2024 supporting nursing and health charities, community gardens and gardeners. The bible in Romans 8 tells us:


'we know that in all things God works for the good of those who love him, who have been called according to his purpose.'

Cherveral Wood Walk 4.8 miles 1.75 hrs.


This walk starts by parking the car on the wide grass verge on the lane opposite to Spring Wood Farm. (farm house now demolished and a new property built). Take the bridleway on this well signed path. As you leave Cherveral Wood there are fine views over the Trent Valley. The path drops down towards Park Leys. Turn left when you meet the road. Turn right on the marked path and follow this back towards the farm. Round the edge of the farm on clearly marked paths. At the way marker turn right through a narrow wood. Continue straight ahead, farm buildings on your left. The path continues across the fields and turn right below Muskham Woodhouse farm. A well marked paths lead to Averham Park.

A shorter walk can be made using this footpath and missing out Park Leys and Muskham Woodhouse. This walk is 2.75 miles

Turn right when you reach the houses and then left down the path to the kissing gate. Right through the next kissing gate. Left and follow the field boundary. Follow the path straight on where the other path turns left. In the bottom of the field is a footbridge over a ditch. Follow the way markers back to the main A617. Turn right over the stile and up the road to the start. Can be muddy through Cherveral Wood and from Park Leys to Muskham Woodhouse.

A lovely walk well worth the effort.


