As I walk around the roads of our villages it saddens me to see so much litter around our level crossings and the parking bays. North Muskham Parish Council invites us to join a collective litter pick on 5th April.

#### Can you help?

You will also read in this edition about the work of the Nottinghamshire ARG. (Amphibian and Reptile Group). Volunteers are on toad and frog patrol along Crow Lane. I had no idea we had volunteers chaperoning these creatures to their breeding ponds. Helping them to cross the road safely. As is often the way a small goup of dedicated individuals are giving their time to protect these creatures that do play an important, if unrecognised, role in our eco system.

#### Can you help?

If crawling (toads) and hopping (frogs) creatures are not your thing, did you know our local school is looking for volunteers to listen to the children read?

Obviously volunteers need to complete the necessary Safeguarding checks before they can work with the children. It is a wonderful privilege to see children develop this vital skill. Skills may include previous experience or work with social and/ or community enterprises, accountancy, secretarial, retail management, promotion and marketing etc. People with other relevant skills would be welcomed albeit we are looking for a group no larger than perhaps 12.

Meetings would be possibly monthly with sub groups meeting as necessary in between.



# Happy Easter

We come now to the most meaningful time of the Christian year, for me personally as a boy and even more so when responsible for organising services. Palm Sunday 13<sup>th</sup> April is the start of Holy Week made special with beginning in the open air, receiving our palm crosses and processing to church behind a donkey. We begin by claiming Christ as King and then find ourselves failing him as the week progresses, leading up to Maundy Thursday when we find Jesus washing his disciples' feet and commanding us to follow his example.

Christ's example of humility has been followed by our kings and queens down the centuries. It was a great day when Queen Elizabeth came to Southwell Minster and instead of washing their feet gave deserving pensioners purses of money. There were still sweet-smelling posies and courtiers bearing towels. As the royal couple entered the minster Prince Philip asked me "Where's the lectern?". He was reading a lesson. I noticed an equerry was holding a bible behind his back, I realised the care and preparation the Queen and Prince Philip took before public occasions. Those receiving the purses remarked on the way in which they were made to feel so special.

The royal Maundy Service was a special, but the Maundy service shared with our Methodist friends at North and South Muskham had an even greater significance for me when the Methodist minister and I washed each other's feet. Way back again in the presence of the Queen in 2003, Anglicans and Methodists signed a covenant to heal the divisions between our churches and become one again. So as churches we got engaged but still not married! Sharing in that 'feet washing' was a precious acknowledgement of each other's ministry. How our Lord must long for us to be united.

Maundy Thursday is also the day on which Jesus took bread and wine, blessed them and said "This is my body, This is my blood" representing the sacrifice of his body and blood on the cross, which command we obey week by week in our churches.

Before his arrest Jesus went away to keep watch and pray with his disciples. They kept falling asleep. It is a tradition to keep watch and pray through the night of Maundy Thursday. As a boy scout at my boyhood Church, we had a rota to keep the watch unbroken through the night, I used to feel so grown up.

Good Friday again was so special, at one time in London. Shops were closed. The main service then and now throughout the country has been a three-hour service from 12 noon to 3pm, sharing with Jesus his last hours on the cross. The service consists of meditations, hymns and quiet reflection. Those not able to come for all the time enter and leave during the hymns. In the Riverside Parishes we have had Messy Church hot cross bun services and Averham Good Friday specials with young people making Easter cards and Easter garlands, wooden crosses and cakes.


On Easter Eve we take breath and prepare for Easter Day. I should like to share with you one particular Easter Day when we lived at Southwell Minster. As a family we set out for the dawn Easter service. Our boys were not too keen on cathedral services, but they liked a challenge. Getting up at dawn was one of these. Silently we gathered at the Minster porch, a fire was burning, the door opened, and we were greeted by the Bishop "Christ is risen" "He is indeed" we replied. A large candle was lit and our hand-held candles as we processed into the Minster.

Readings from the bible followed telling of God's dealing with us from Adam and Eve on to the coming of his Son, his death and resurrection. Next, we turned to the font, one of the men in the Minster's confirmation class was to be baptised. To the question "Do you turn to Christ?". He movingly replied "I turn to Christ". Water was poured as a symbol that he was born again. We were all splashed with water reminding us of our own baptisms. The service concluded with Holy Communion and the Bishop's blessing after which he and his wife invited us to the Bishop's Manor for hot drinks and bacon butties. Back home after lunch I began to take out my tobacco pouch and pipe having given up smoking for Lent. My 14-year-old son declared "Dad's now going to celebrate the resurrection by killing himself". A memorable Easter Day as I have never smoked since.

Lent is upon us, what are you giving up or taking on? I pray that Easter may be a special time for you. Who knows you may even find an Easter egg on Easter day!

May God bless you and keep you.

# Wilderness

We're just coming to the end of lent, a period that marks Jesus' time in the wilderness. What do you think of when you hear the word wilderness?

Wilderness can be seen as a beautiful and absolutely necessary part of the earth's life. Did you know that unless a large proportion of the earth's surface is left as wilderness, a high percentage of species would be driven into extinction, and the climate would no longer sustain life. We cannot live without wilderness. If we see wilderness as a metaphor, this is still true. We all need breathing space, time to just be, peace and quiet, and the opportunity to retreat, regroup, and get a better perspective on life. Wilderness is **necessary**. Similarly, *fallow* is a farming technique in which arable land is left without sowing for one or more vegetative cycles. The goal of fallowing is to allow the land to recover and store organic matter while retaining moisture and disrupting pest life cycles and soil borne pathogens by temporarily removing their hosts. I wonder if, we sometimes need to find time to lie fallow, to rest, to breathe, to find space. It can be difficult in a world that measures productivity, but wilderness space is necessary for us too.

Wilderness can also be seen as a situation of austerity – a desert place, offering no luxury. Intimidating, disheartening, and downright dangerous; time in the wilderness is daunting and not something to look forward to. It's a place where survival skills are called for. Metaphorically, it could be reflected in loneliness or depression, maybe bereavement; adversity - tough times. We all go through wilderness times; wilderness is inevitable. When have you felt yourself in a time of wilderness? When have you felt lonely, depressed, bereaved. What I notice about the time that Jesus was in the wilderness is that though it seems like he was alone, he never was. Firstly, he was led there by the spirit. Secondly, he was attended by angels! You may feel like you're in a time of wilderness but know that you too are never alone. I'm reminded of the story of the young braves' rite of passage. At 13 they would spend a night, alone in the woods. A wilderness experience. One particular brave was petrified in the darkness but as the sun rose, the light illuminated a figure not too far away. The figure turned out to be his father, bow and arrow poised to protect him. It turned out that he had never been alone. Like the young brave's father, God is always with us, even when we don't notice!

Finally, wilderness can be a place of formation. For Jesus it was a time to be tested and formed, in that time of self-denial, for what he came to do. Some of the world's great religions emerged from desert cultures; perhaps in the desert there is time and space to think and pray, whereas in wetter climates the mind naturally focuses on organising stout houses, umbrellas, and gumboots. Wilderness is **formational**. Maybe you need to see the wilderness as an opportunity. The spirit leads Jesus into the wilderness. There's a purpose. Not only that but it's at the time that Jesus is ready to begin his ministry; he's put to the test, he's formed by the challenges, and, at the end, the angels tend to him, leaving the wilderness ready to face what is ahead.

Which aspect of wilderness do you most associate with?

What does God want to teach you through Who can you reach out to in the wilderness? What might God be preparing you for? What distractions must you throw off to embrace the wilderness space that will allow you to be changed, formed... trans-formed in the wilderness? wilderness?

#### **Bathley Parish Council Brief notes from Bathley Parish Council Meeting** 8<sup>th</sup> January 2025

Representatives of North Muskham Parish Council gave a presentation about the Joint Neighbourhood Plan. It was agreed that BPC would discuss the matter further and advise North Muskham when a decision has been made as to whether to join or not. Thanks were given to Gary Hobbs and members of North Muskham PC for their input and the invitation for Bathley to join.

Flooding concerns were raised along Chapel Lane where drains/toilets have been blocked. It was agreed to contact Severn Trent to organise an inspection. Roads/pot holes are an ongoing problem. It was agreed that BPC would continue to highlight problems and follow up timescales from Notts County Council regarding road improvements. We continue to request specific dates for road and culvert improvements and are advised that we will be notified in the spring.

The GNR Solar Park issues were discussed and it was approved that BPC would contribute their share towards the planning consultant as agreed. Thanks were given to all who have contributed to the ongoing consultations.'

Bathley PC's AGM will be held on 14<sup>th</sup> May – 7.30pm for the AGM and 8pm for the general meeting held at The Crown in Bathley.

#### Summary of North Muskham Parish Council Meeting 10th March 2025

1. The Council supported, (by a majority decision), the objection of the District Council's Conservation Officer regarding the planning application at The Shades, Main Street.

2. The Council supported (unanimously) the revised planning application for a dog walking facility at Burridge Farm.

3.It was noted that there were several vacant plots at the allotment and as such the Council would seek a contractor to grass seed the 2 plots for easier maintenance but with the allotment holders to further promote the availability of plots and carryout other improvements to the allotments.

4. A response submission to the statutory consultation stage of the GNR Solar project had been sent by the planning consultant commissioned by Joint Parish Council Group (JPAG) and one also by the Parish Council.

5. A village litter pick will take place on **Saturday April 5th** and volunteers are invited to attend the Village Hall at 10 am to collect litter pickers and sacks. Refreshments will be provided and all are welcome to help give the village a spring clean. At the same time there will be an emergency planning session and test of the new generator

6. The Council ha noted and welcomed the commitment of the new land owner of "North Marsh" and stated their commitment to work with him for the betterment and maintenance of that area and bridleway.

7. VE 80 celebrations and commemorations will take place at The Ferry Pub on the evening of May 8th and will include a VE day period quiz and a Beacon. The Beacon will be lit in line with the national beacon initiative at 9.30pm. All are very welcome.

8. The Council confirmed it's agreement to provide for additional seating and a picnic table at the village playground from funds from the proceeds of the community lottery -this being additional to furniture being supplied by the MRCC from kind donations. The new safety surfacing at the toddler swings was noted. The generous donations from villagers would be used to complete the works and ringfenced for further improvements at the playing area. The Clerk will again chase the outcome of the grant application to support the maintenance and improvement fund and to add to monies kindly donated. A cut off date was agreed being the next meeting when regardless of the grant, the remaining safety surfacing work will carried out.

9. The results of the Cafehub Survey were noted and a steering group will now be formed to further explore viability and move the project forward. Any persons with relevant skills and experience with community/social projects, accountancy, secretarial, retail management, marketing etc should please contact myself on 07891 057812.

10. The defibrillator, previously housed at Pina's Hair Business, will be re-sited in due course at a property east of Main Street near the bus shelter across from the entrance to The Grange. Information will be shared once it is in place. In the meantime all should note that another defibrillator continues to be sited at the MRCC and Alison Luke has kindly offered to provide further training sessions on its use.

11. The meeting welcomed County Councillor Saddington and a further prospective County Council election candidate.

### Toad and Frog Patrol is Here!!

It's that time of year again when amphibians including common toad *Bufo bufo*, common frog *Rana temporaria* and smooth newt *Lissotriton vulgaris* are acting out their own Love Island, but first they have to reach the island...or in this case a pond !

Amphibians spend most of their time feeding on invertebrates in woodland, hedgerows, marshes and tussocky grassland. They hibernate underground, often among tree roots, in hedge bottoms, underground soil voids or in old walls.

We probably all have childhood memories of dabbling for tadpoles in ponds or even watching some grow in an aquarium in the kitchen. Amphibians lay their eggs in water where their young hatch out into tadpoles or newtlets. Toad eggs appear as long strings of black eggs and frog eggs appear as large jelly mass. Newt eggs are laid individually on a leaf by the female and then they are carefully wrapped up and sealed using their hind legs and a secretion.

Frogspawn has always been one of the earliest and most eagerly anticipated signs of spring, but with a trend for milder winters it can be seen earlier than ever. Late January and early February records are certainly not uncommon.

"Usually, spawning begins in the south-west, then advances across the country in a north-westerly direction, moving around frost pockets," says John Buckley of the Amphibian and Reptile Conservation Trust. "Day length and air temperature fire the starting gun. Keep an eye on your thermometer for when it hits 5°C." Frogs can breed in colder conditions than toads, which mate from March onwards when the temperature reaches 7°C. Unlike toads, frogs typically hibernate in or near their breeding ponds, so there is no need to migrate there first. There are obvious advantages to starting the breeding season early, but frogs can only spawn once each year – any spawn lost to freezing weather is not replaced.

We are now in the local, breeding migration period for amphibians and some animals will have a very short distance to reach a breeding pond, while others, typically toads, will travel further.

Many ponds have been infilled over the years and so this can out pressure on remaining ponds and mean that amphibians have no choice but to use the remaining ponds. A range of factors including weather, disease, predation and pollution can affect breeding success and one of them which is an important factor is crossing a road. Road traffic fatalities can have a significant effect on amphibian populations.

Crow Lane between South Muskham and Little Carlton is one the Nottinghamshire Reptile and Amphibian Group (Notts ARG) toad patrol roads where volunteers are needed to help patrol the lane during the amphibian breeding season and make sure animals safely make it to their breeding ponds. We all wear high vis clothing and use torches to help our search and help to keep us safe on the roadside.

Over the past couple of weeks, we have been out toad patrolling on milder evenings just after dark finding common toads, common frogs and smooth newts which we have collected and moved to the edge of the large breeding pond, their own "love island" on the southern edge of the lane.






